Principles Prioritising education

The impacts of having missed education during the pandemic are severe for children, young people and adults. In all cases, any benefits in managing transmission should be weighed against any educational drawbacks.

Decision-makers should endeavour to keep any measures in education and childcare to the minimum number of settings or groups possible, and for the shortest amount of time possible.

Decision-makers should keep all measures under regular review, and lift them as soon as the evidence supports doing so.

Measures affecting education and childcare settings across an area should not be considered in isolation, but as part of a broader package of measures.

Attendance restrictions should only ever be considered as a last resort.

Where measures include attendance restrictions, the Department for Education (DfE) may advise on any groups that should be prioritised.

The government will try to give as much notice as possible of any changes to the way settings should operate.

All education and childcare settings should have outbreak management plans outlining how they would operate if any of the measures described below were recommended for their setting or area.

This includes how they would ensure every child, pupil or student receives the quantity and quality of education and care to which they are normally entitled.

This document outlines the outbreak management plans in pace at Nottingham Girls' Academy. It should be seen as indicative only; in the event of an outbreak of Covid-19, school leaders will respond to advice from Public Health officials and implement and adapt plans accordingly.

Testing

Further measures may be advised:

- for an individual setting or a small cluster of settings only, by directors of public health as part of their responsibilities in outbreak management (in most cases a 'cluster' will be no more than 3 or 4 settings linked in the same outbreak), or
- for settings across areas that have been offered an enhanced response package, where settings and directors of public health decide it is appropriate.

Reintroducing ATS would need to be agreed with schools. Public Health officials will consult settings and work with them to identify what support may be needed to do this. Schools and colleges should consider how ATS could be implemented in a way that does not negatively impact on the education they provide to their pupils and students.

Face coverings

Secondary schools and colleges should make sure their outbreak management plans cover the possibility that it is advised that face coverings should temporarily be worn more widely in settings in their area.

This may include face coverings in communal areas (for pupils and students) and/or classrooms (for both pupils, students and staff).

Any guidance should allow for reasonable exemptions for their use.

These measures may be advised:

- for an individual setting or a small cluster of settings only, by directors of public health as part of their responsibilities in outbreak management (in most cases a 'cluster' will be no more than 3 or 4 settings linked in the same outbreak), or
- for settings across areas that have been offered an enhanced response package, where settings and directors of public health decide it is appropriate.

In all cases any educational drawbacks in the recommended use of face coverings should be balanced with the benefits in managing transmission.

Possible Measure	Implementation Details (person responsible indicated in brackets)
Reintroduction of face-coverings in communal areas.	 Communication of requirement to wear face coverings (except for those exempt) to parents via SMS, email and school website (DTU). Procurement of additional face-coverings for those pupils that forget, lose or damage their own. Exempt pupils and staff asked to wear orange lanyards. Additional exemption lanyards issued as required. (HoYs)
Reintroduction of face-coverings in communal areas including outside (unless eating or drinking)	 As above, but with the inclusion of outside areas due to poor social distancing by pupils.
Reintroduction of face coverings in communal areas, including classrooms	As above but with the inclusion of classrooms.

Shielding

Shielding is currently paused. In the event of a major outbreak or VoC that poses a significant risk to individuals on the shielded patient list (SPL), ministers can agree to reintroduce shielding. Shielding would be considered in addition to other measures to address the residual risk to people on the SPL, once the wider interventions are taken into account.

Settings should make sure their outbreak management plans cover this possibility.

Shielding can only be reintroduced by national government.

Possible Measure	Implementation Details (person responsible indicated in brackets)
Staff on the SPL will be asked to work from home.	 Teaching staff will be asked to deliver lessons from home via Teams. Supply staff will act as their eyes and ears in the classroom. (KAS) Support staff will be asked to work from home and/or for hours where contact with others on site is negligible (in which case an individual vulnerable persons RA will be carried out and agreed first). Where duties cannot be performed at home, alternative duties will be agreed with the employee, their LM and the Principal (LMs/DTU). If their absence has a negative impact on the running of the academy, replacement cover will be sought from GAT or an agency (LM/DTU).

Attendance

Attendance restrictions should only ever be considered in extreme circumstances and as a last resort.

Settings should make sure their outbreak management plans cover the possibility they are advised to limit attendance.

If attendance restrictions are advised across an area, the government will publish detailed operational guidance for settings.

High-quality remote education should be provided for all pupils or students not attending.

In all circumstances, priority should continue to be given to vulnerable children and young people and children of critical workers to attend to their normal timetables.

reason for absence and discuss their concerns
 encourage the child or young person to attend educational
provision, working with the local authority and social worker
(where applicable), particularly where the social worker and
the Virtual School Head (where applicable) agrees that the
child or young person's attendance would be appropriate
 focus the discussions on the welfare of the child or young
person and ensuring that the child or young person is able to
access appropriate education and support while they are at
home
 have in place procedures to maintain contact, ensure they are
able to access remote education support, as required, and
regularly check if they are doing so
 Hot and cold meals will continue to be provided to all pupils attending
site, but Breakfast Club and Breaktime provision may be suspended
and the menu for lunch time may be restricted. Meals will be available
free of charge to all pupils who meet the benefits-related free school
meals eligibility criteria. (VBR/BGR)
• FSM Vouchers that can be used at local supermarkets will be provided
to all pupils who meet the benefits-related free school meals eligibility
criteria in KS3 or are not attending school because they:
 are self-isolating
 have had symptoms or a positive test result themselves
 are a close contact of someone who has COVID-19 (VBR/HTH)
• Educational visits for pupil in KS3 will be suspended and for pupils in
KS4 and KS5 will be carefuly reviewed. Any attendance restrictions
should be reflected in the visits risk assessment and setting leaders
should consider carefully if the educational visit is still appropriate and
safe. Only children who are attending the setting should go on an
educational visit. Education settings should consult the health and
safety guidance on educational visits when considering visits.(KAS)

Bubbles

Outbreak management plans should cover the possibility that in some local areas it may become necessary to reintroduce 'bubbles' for a temporary period, to reduce mixing between groups.

Any decision to recommend the reintroduction of 'bubbles' would not be taken lightly and would need to take account of the detrimental impact they can have on the delivery of education.
