

Pupils in year 8 took part in a fantastic day of workshops on 4 February covering some of our statutory obligations regarding the teaching of relationships and sex education, and also topics of wider concern for pupils of this age group. The pupils enjoyed a day off-timetable to explore issues such as healthy relationships, delivered by Nottingham based charity, Equation; basic information around contraception and the increasingly important issue of consent in friendships and relationships. Year 8 pupils also enjoyed a fantastic workshop on 'finding your voice', led by Heidi Shewell-Cooper from Nottingham Citizens. Our amazing year 10 Citizens' ambassadors, Hayat and Rasan, helped facilitate the sessions with Heidi, and even one of our ex-students and Nottingham Citizens' members, Sanaa Aalia, came back to take part.

This was a truly outstanding workshop as year 8 pupils got to voice what is really important to them. Comments such as, 'We feel we are really being listened to' and 'It's the first time anyone has asked me what I think' showed us that this type of 'listening' activity was long overdue.

The pupils have had so much to cope with over the past few years after all! The fantastic Freedom Foundation finished the day with their workshop on the harms of social media and, most importantly, teaching coping strategies, movement and breathing techniques for helping pupils cope with the anxiety that is increasingly common in our nation's young people.

Year 9 - Prison! Me! No Way!

The hugely reputed and highly sought-after organisation, Prison! Me! No Way!, came into school on Friday 25 February to deliver sessions to our year 9 pupils on the harms and dangers of life in the 'real world'. Ex-prison staff, police and fire officers, including the stand-out, unforgettable ex-offender, Jenny, all led workshops and sessions that left the year 9 pupils humbled and more knowledgeable about how the choices we make – sometimes in a split second - can have repercussions that can be felt for the rest of our lives. The pupils sat in total, captivated silence as Jenny told her story, and had the opportunity to ask questions that were answered with a heart-felt, genuine honesty. The session was truly mesmerising. The pupils also heard first-hand about the more recent phenomenon of county-lines drug smuggling, where criminals use young, vulnerable children to conduct their business, and also about child sexual exploitation, and the dangers and warning signs to look out for.

Year 11 PSHE Day

Year 11 PSHE day, which was held on Thursday 10 March this year, was a little different to normal. We asked the pupils what they would like to do; the answer was, 'Please, not another session on sex education'! In one way, it shows that we are doing our job as this statutory information is well embedded by year 11. On the other hand, it highlights the need of our pupils for some light relief, they are clearly feeling the pressure of exams looming, constant Teacher Assessed Grade collections and the stress of thinking about their future.

So, this time round, although we still had to cover certain statutory aspects such as Consent and Child Exploitation delivered by Equation and the fantastic Vanessa from Mariposa RSE, we held workshops on more practical issues, such as Financial Matters led by Miss Elharm. Pupils had asked us for information on how to open a bank account, and how to plot salary against outgoings of bills and living costs. They had questions such as, 'What's the difference between a credit card and a debit card? What is an overdraft? What's the best type of student account'? This session was a real eye-opener for some of our pupils who are starting to think about life after GCSEs.

Mental health is also a huge issue for our pupils as it is across the country, and our pupils had highlighted this topic as something they wanted and needed to talk about.

Miss Gascoyne led an important session on recognising signs of anxiety and stress, the importance of communication and dealing with mental health issues including where they can get help if needed.

The stand-out workshop of the day; however, had to be the self-defence workshop from Gracie Barra Jiu-Jitsu. We had full use of the gym and we got the crash mats out to do some street self-defence which doubled as a handy stress relief exercise, and the opportunity to let out some latent aggression! The year 11s threw themselves into it, literally, as Jiu-Jitsu is a martial art which is based around grappling your opponent to the floor. However, our pupils left a little more confident than when they went in and were busy practicing on their unfortunate siblings during lunchtime!

As PSHE Coordinator, it never fails to amaze me how much the world throws at our young people; the dangers and issues they have to deal with when they are at their most vulnerable, and how very important our job is. We deliver information on topics and issues that are directly affecting them in and out of school, but crucially we also deliver on issues that could affect them or people they know, therefore safeguarding them against possible harms. Education is **the** most important weapon in our fight against these ever more present issues, and we thank you for the overwhelming support we receive in keeping our students safe and preparing them for the modern world.






Careers - Trip to the University of Sheffield









